## DISSERTATION

This dissertation comprises three papers on the causes and consequences of the 1960s urban riots. The first paper, “What Effect Does Police Response Have on Riot Severity?” codes news and government reports of urban riots to demonstrate that law enforcement behavior is strongly correlated to the severity of incidents of civil unrest. The second paper, “Did the 1960s Urban Riots Reshape American Politics?” demonstrates that the location, timing and severity of urban riots is strongly associated with the county-level vote share for the Democratic party in presidential and congressional elections in the late 1960s and early 1970s. The third paper, “Did Urban Riots Increase Demand for Law and Order Politics?” analyzes longer-run effects of disorders on variation in state-level enactment of tough on crime criminal justice policies in the 1970s and 1980s.

## WORKING PAPERS

- "Did the 1960s Urban Riots Reshape American Politics?"*  
Demonstrates that the location, timing and severity of urban riots is strongly associated with the county-level vote share for the Democratic party in presidential and congressional elections in the late 1960s and early 1970s.
- "Reconciling Race and Causation,"* (with Maya Sen)  
Proposes two extensions to the prior literature on causal inference with "immutable characteristics" that reconciles race and causation in some cases.
- "How Are Vitamin D and Race Associated with Mortality?"*  
Analyzes data on individual-level serum 25(OH)D levels in 1988 and incidence of mortality by 2006 to assess associations, by race, of vitamin D deficiency and mortality.
- "Can Tweets Kill A Movie? An Empirical Evaluation of the "'Bruno' Effect,"*  
Investigates whether positive nor negative comments on Twitter are associated with changes in box office performance and finds evidence that suggests the volume of tweets provides useful information for predicting opening weekend box office performance.
- "Why Red-light Districts? Prostitution and Municipal State Formation, 1822-1874."*  
Uses cases to address why tolerated zones of lawbreaking were the default solution for regulating prostitution. Also proposes a theory of what factors led different cities to try varied approaches to regulating prostitution.
- "What Effect Does Police Response Have on Urban Riot Severity?"*  
Codes news and government reports of urban riots to demonstrate that law enforcement behavior is strongly correlated to the severity of incidents of civil unrest.

*"Did the Rise of Crack Cocaine Increase Dropouts?"*

Evaluates the possible association between increases in high school dropouts and an index of the prevalence of crack cocaine in 144 cities between 1980 to 2000.

*"It's Not about Race at K: Analyzing the Evolution of the Black-White Test Score Gap in the First Six Years of School,"* (with Elena Llaudet)

Confirms and extends the results of Fryer & Levitt (2004) demonstrating that the disparity in academic achievement between blacks and whites only begins after students arrive in school, after controlling for a small set of socioeconomic, family and health related characteristics.
